The GPS

• The GPS overarches all of the documentation, research, and writing standards described in Genealogy Standards, and is applied across the board in all genealogical research to measure the credibility of conclusions about ancestral identities, relationships, and life events.

Do You Use A Research Log?

- Helps you focus on what you are looking to find.
- Saves time by not redoing the same search.
- Saves money by not ordering documents already in your files.
- Helps you plan your next step.
- Should list positive and negative results.
- Reveals your unanswered questions.
- Helps you from chasing bright shiny objects.
- Helps you from heading down rabbit holes.

Do You Use A Source Check Sheet?

- Helps you be focused in your research.
- Helps you know if you have done a reasonably exhaustive search.
- Helps you know what records might help you answer your genealogy question.
- Gives you ideas for records you may not have considered.

Do You Cite Your Sources?

- Every time!
- Important so you or someone else can locate the document you used for your information.
- Be sure to include:
 - Who
 - What
 - When
 - Where

Do You Understand The Power Of Negative Evidence?

- Using the absence of records to your advantage in research.
- Information hidden below the surface or totally absent helps researchers reconstruct events, identities, and relationships that no record specifies.
- In the absence of any positive evidence, it is feasible to arrive at a sound conclusion from the negative evidence that you have gathered during your research.

Do You Use The FAN Club Method?

- Friends, Associates, Neighbors
- Renowned genealogist and author Elizabeth Shown Mills, coined the phrase "FAN Club" for genealogical purposes. She points out the significance of not only searching records for an ancestor's surname, but also paying attention to documents about the ancestor's "FAN Club." Historical information, she says, is like real estate: the true value of any piece of information is unknown until it is put into community context.

Cluster Genealogy

- Cluster Genealogy is a research technique employed by genealogists to learn more about an ancestor by examining records left by the ancestor's cluster.
- A person's cluster consists of the Extended Family, Friends, Neighbors and Other Associates, such as business partners. Researching the lives of an ancestor's cluster leads to a more complete and more accurate picture of the ancestor's life.




